Community Engagement Grant – Andy Hoye

- ❖ Each neighborhood gets \$850 to spend by November 15, 2022.
- Decision must be made by May 20, 2022.
- ❖ If we don't use the money it will go back into a pool of funds that the CA can use. CA is considering purchasing an OWL 360 recording devices that records a hybrid meeting and everything in the room on the screen. Each one is about \$1,200. (Later in the meeting Kris reported that the list price was \$999) Perhaps the CA will buy several and neighborhoods can borrow them.
- ❖ To qualify for the funds, the neighborhood must report on howthe funds were used in the past and the effect on attendance at neighborhood meetings. Southgate would report that last year's funds were spent on stickers to correct the meeting date on our yard signs but due to Covid we have not returned to in-person meetings and cannot gauge the effect of the expenditure.
- Summer looked intohosting an outdoor movie presentation. There is only one company that rents the blow-upscreens and the cost is greater than the grant. We would need to get a sponsor to make up the difference and Summer does not have time to follow up on that at this time.
- Question from chat: Could we use the funds for signs along Thurston reminding drivers that the speed limit is 30? Answer from Andy: The general purpose of the Engagement grant is to build capacity and activity in the Neighborhood Council itself...my guess is that it would be denied - BUT I will ask the Budget Committee.
- Question from chat: What is the "hybrid" possibility at the ESD?Shouldn't the neighborhood council try to offer as standard practice a hybrid meeting option in order to expand participation?
- Send any suggestions to Rita for Board discussion.

- Paul suggested that the cycle 10 (next cycle) list of traffic calming improvements and construction should be reported to Southgate.
- One of those items is curbline improvements and Summer has emailed the city asking what those are.
- ❖ Lynda asked about the traffic plans around Ferris and 37th. Barry recapped the plans which are awaiting funding.

Land Use Committee

- ❖ Daycare (46th Ct and Freya) Andy has no further news. Rita says 3 houses are being built. Barry reports that the one house sold closed for \$1.1million.
- ❖ Barry notes that the memory care center is going forward and asks if there is any news on the development across from Target. Rita will look into that.
- Jerry asks for news on the Shopko property and points out that there is a lot of dirt being moved behind the Maverick station. Rita sees a Black sign there but there have been no permits issued. Rita will do a little digging.

Other

Mayor or one of her staff to attend neighborhood meetings.- Paul points out that this is a big step in accountability as the mayor is responsible for doing what the city code says.

Returning to In-Person Meetings

- **SESD 101** restrictions have been lifted but may return in the future.
- Meeting attendance varies depending on the issues more than zoom versus inperson.
- Summer moved that we zoom for the May meeting and reevaluate next month. Andy seconded. Passed
- Moving ahead, having an in-person option is probably going to be expected so we should prepare for hybrid meetings. Rita will talk to ESD 101 about how to

do a hybrid meeting. If we don't like that, we will explore other possibilities such as borrowing an OWL system.

□ Paul Kropp: Early warning- 2 Liaison positions (Design Review Board, Plan Commission) will be opening later this year. Paul will follow-up after the summer to remind CA of need for nominations.
☐ Mary Winkes: Happy to renew role as Plan Commission liaison. At beginning of the Plan Commission
Report there is a synopsis from Jackie Churchill in the report to review. Proposed comprehensive planamendments are included in the report and see if there's anything impacting your neighborhood.
☐ Fran Papenleur: Announcement- Spokane Parks Foundation is having a silent fundraiser at GeneralStore during month of April, portion of proceeds from sales at the General Store will go to the Make-a-Splash program, which provides swimsuits, swim lessons, water safety clinics, and more to children.
□ Scot Webb: Millennium Northwest LLC is planning to put a development in the neighborhood, and anytime the neighborhood council requests updates and presentations, they haven't been successfulin connecting in their desired way to give feedback to the developers. Scot is requesting that the CAwrite a letter to support a moratorium on the development until Millennium Northwest LLC meetswith the neighborhood council to discuss concerns. They're unsatisfied with current communication between neighborhood and the developers.

Legislative Agenda: **Council President BreeanBeggs' Report:** □ New Councilmembers have completed their first quarter in office. New CMs are filling in their rolessmoothly. ☐ City finances are not strong coming out of the pandemic. Reserves are low, and the project costs arehigh, causing financial strain. Seven open labor contracts that haven't been renewed and thenegotiations of those contracts will put additional financial strain for up to 2 years. ☐ Homelessness: City Council passed/changed many laws regarding homelessness. The Mayor/City hasnot been able to find enough shelter beds yet, which makes enforcing the homelessness-related lawsdifficult. The Mayor will be announcing her plan to address homelessness soon (April 27), to explainhow the City plans to comply with laws and find more shelter space. New shelter expected to opensoon, RFP for shelter operator went out last week. ☐ Affordable Housing: In June 2021, affordable housing plan was passed. Plan Commission and PlanningDepartment are figuring out ways to implement the plan that was passed. ☐ Climate change: Snow melt and water levels are concerning, worried about water needs in the latesummer. \$13 million tank being built in Airway Heights now. Observing drought responses. Mightneed to build multi-million dollar infrastructure to address. The wells that the city pumps water from has a significant impact on the river's water levels. □ \$80 million ARPA funding: Trying to get the money approved and into the community. Housing, childcare, first-time home buyers, parks, mental health, apprentice training are some of the focusareas of where that funding will go.

Administrative Committee Updates (Seth Knutson):
☐ Community Assembly/City Council (CA/CC) Meeting Recap:
They discussed the potential of a homeless shelter on Trent. Vehicles were purchased for the policedepartment (35 vehicles). Relations between developers and neighborhoods were brought up, CPBeggs will follow-up. Four more traffic officers plan to join the force. Speed radar cameras were discussed as they were in this meeting.

50% of the red-light camera money goes to the state, and theother 50% goes to City but realistically leaves us only 25% of the funds to work with. Presence at CityCouncil meetings was brought up.
☐ Presence at City Council meetings: Fran brought up that presence at the City Council meeting wasoften issue-based, when there was strong support for some large issue that the CA and NCs wantedto bring to City Council. Then a CA rep would be designated as the guest to bring forth that topic atthe City Council meeting.
☐ In-Person Meeting Discussion: The City Council Briefing Chambers seem to be the best location, butcontinued construction makes parking downtown difficult. Other locations voiced concern over hybridcapabilities. A return to in-person only meetings would mean lack of access for virtual meetings.
Admin plans to continue the CA meeting being hosted virtually on WebEx in May.
Office of Neighborhood Services Update (Carly Cortright):
☐ Carly will send out an email on Monday to the neighborhoods about the Administration's desire tohave a presence at the neighborhood council meetings. Administrative guests at the neighborhoodcouncil meetings would like 5-10 minutes on the NC agendas to introduce themselves or give a smallpresentation.
☐ Annica's last day was April 1. We are short-staffed with CPC positions in ONS. Could be July until wehave someone hired in the empty role.
☐ Clean-Up Program: Events were finalized! There are still some fall openings for roll-off events.
☐ Mobile Speed Feedback Trailers: Annie is working on finalizing the schedule for trailer placement.C.O.P.S. Volunteers will be helping us place trailers as well. Traffic Calming resolution is
